Near Alice Springs there is an ochre pit that the children enjoyed visiting. Kaylee and Sean drew pictures with the ochre and made some of it into paint. Ochre is a coloured pigment in rocks that Aborigines have been using for thousands of years for art and body painting. It was used to record things of great importance to the people.

Ochre is one of the first pigments ever used. It may even have been used by Moses when he wrote down God's laws. The Bible was first written on stones, then later scrolls made from animal skins. (It took a whole flock of sheep to write down all of God's laws.) The New Testament was written on an early type of paper called papyrus. It was copied many times over the years, but just as there are still Aboriginal paintings from thousands of years ago, we also have copies of parts of the Bible and other writings from thousands of years ago too.
